COURSE OUTCOME:

Semester 1, Paper- CC1 (IndianPhilosophy)

At the end of the course students will be able to:

They will acquire elaborate knowledge about the various theories , beliefs and opinions of Carvaka, Buddhism, Jainism, Naiyayikas and Vaisesikas with critical understanding from both epistemological and metaphysical perspectives.

CO2 They will acquire elaborate knowledge about the various theories, beliefs and opinions of Carvaka, Buddhism, Jainism, Naiyayikas and Vaisesikas with critical understanding from both epistemological and metaphysical perspectives.

CO3 Realize that there is something beyond the logical world.

CO4 Understand the vedic theism and upanisadic conception of Atman & Brahman.

CO4 Elucidate the Vedanta Philosophy.

Paper - CC2 :Logic (Western)-1

At the end of the course students will be able to:

CO1 Students will be oriented with basic terms of Logic like propositions, sentences, arguments, truth, validity etc. They will come to know of quality, quantity and distribution of terms of Categorical Propositions.

CO2 Students will learn about differences between Deductive and Inductive Logic and also between Traditional and Modern Logic. They will learn various methods of mediate and immediate inferences.

CO3 Students will be familiar with Existential Import of categorical propositions and also with rules and fallacies of Categorical Syllogism. They will be able to test validity of deductive arguments by Venn Diagrams.

CO4 The course helps the students to learn logical analysis, deduction and develop a rational bend of mind.

CO5 Comprehend the importance of symbolic logic in modern world.

SEMESTER 2, Paper - CC3 (Western Philosophy)-1

At the end of the course students will be able to:

CO1 Students will be acquainted with the historical development of western philosophy.

CO2 The outline of western philosophy consists of the epistemological and metaphysical perspectives of the philosophers like Socrates, Plato, Descartes, Spinoza, Leibnitz.

CO3 Students will be acquainted with the concept of rationalism.

Paper- CC4: Ethics

CO1 Students will have deep knowledge and willdevelop critical understanding about Indian Ethics. Indian Ethics includes Purusarthas and their inter-relations.

CO2 Students will have detailed information about Western Ethics and will develop critical insight on this.

CO3 Ethics being a normative study gives ideas about what is right and what is wrong in human actions. The study of ethics can promote a sense of duty and responsibility among the students.

CO4 Acquire complete knowledge about the core ideas of Hedonism, Utilitarianism and virtue ethics.

CO5 It brings personal and social growth.

SEMESTER 3: Paper - CC5 (Indian Philosophy)- II

At the end of the course students will be able to:

Paper - CC6 : (Western Philosophy) - II

At the end of the course students will be able to:

CO1 Students will develop detailed knowledge about the modern Empiricist school through the philosophies of Locke, Berkeley, Hume & Kant, their beliefs and doctrines regarding Knowledge and the differences between Rationalism and Empiricism in Modern Western Philosophy.

CO2 A study of western philosophy not only gives a broad idea about western literature and philosophy but also enables students to develop a scientific attitude towards reality.

CO3 Understand the critical philosophy of Kant.

Paper - CC7 : Logic (Western) - II

At the end of the course students will be able to:

CO1 Students will have an understanding of the Value of special symbols like that of conjunction, disjunction, negation, material implication and material equivalence and Stroke / dagger functions.

CO2 Students will learn about differences between Deductive and Inductive Logic and also between Traditional and Modern Logic. They will learn various methods of mediate and immediate inferences.

CO3 Students will be familiar with Existential Import of categorical propositions and also with rules and fallacies of Categorical Syllogism. They will be able to test validity of deductive arguments by Venn Diagrams.

SEMESTER 4, Paper - CC8 (Psychology)

At the end of the course students will be able to:

CO2 The paper provides an understanding of the basic concepts of psychology like sensation, perception, their relations, consciousness, its different levels and Freudian theory of dream. It also focusses on memory, its factors, forgetfulness, different theories of learning and intelligenc

Paper- CC9: (Philosophy of Religion)

At the end of the course students will be able to:

DSE-I

A. An Enquiry Concerning Human Understanding, Devid Hume:

This course helps the students to understand the detailed knowledge about the views of Devid Hume, a modern western empiricist, from both epistemological, metaphysical and ethical perspectives through his book An Enquiry Concerning Human Understanding.

B. Gita:

CO1 Gita is the corner stone of Indian philosophy. The course is an in depth analysis of the basic concept of Brahman, Atman and the relationship between them and the world. Metaphysics of Gita has deep ethical significance it provides a way transcendental life. Learning of the massage of Gita is the outcome of the course.

CO2 At the end of the course, students will be able to develop an understanding of the Bhagavad Gita and they will learn to implement the teaching of the Bhagavad Gita in real life situation.

CO3 Students can be applied to overcome problems in real life like management of stress, control over mind, ethical decision making, leadership skills and problems of justice etc.

DSE-2:

A . Philosophy of Mind:

At the end of the course students will be able to:

B. Problems of Philosophy: Russell

As a subject philosophy wants to develop the skill of critical thinking among the students, The Problems of Philosophy by Bertrand Russell is introduced here. The text includes appearance and reality, existence of matter, idealism, knowledge by acquaintance and knowledge by description and Russell's view about induction has been included in this course.

DSE-3:

A . Feminist Philosophy

CO1 In Feminist philosophy, students will learn some important concepts like 'Sexism', 'Androcentrism', 'Patriarchy', they will come to know about the different kinds of Feminism and also about Feminist approach to Metaphysics, Epistemology and Ethics.

CO2 It will make students aware of various types of inequalities prevalent in our society, what is their cause and how it is related to gender issues.

B. Phenomenology and Existentialism:

CO1 As Existential philosophy investigates a new area of philosophy so the course will help to highlight some new questions for the students as well as for the researcher. We hope by this course one can find his own place in existence and society using the frameworks develops by the Existentialist in order to define ones responsibilities within a community.

CO2 As a key discipline phenomenology will help the students and new researchers to analyse the phenomenological arguments and discussions though it has some distinct features and something different from other philosophical topics. It will help to recognise and reflect the phenomenological learning of Husserl.

DSE-4:

A . Contemporary Indian Philosophy :

At the end of the course students will be able to:

CO1 To acquaint students with the concepts that are central to Indian modernity.

CO2 To understand the dynamics of Indian social reality and its conceptualization.

CO3 To acquaint with different kinds of humanism of different thinkers.

CO4 To acquaint students with the secular interpretation of the caste system. C

CO5 Understand the features of contemporary Indian Philosophy.

CO6Explain and defend a position on basic philosophical problems in the contemporary Indian philosophy.

B. Aesthetics:
